Dear Parents, Students and Friends,

Conyers Aspirations Programme 2023

As part of our positive rewards culture, we have introduced our new 'Conyers Aspirations Programme.' This programme recognises the hard work and effort of all students, based upon the number of positive behaviour points students receive, both

within and beyond the classroom. Students are awarded with an 'aspirations award' in the form of a coloured badge. Badges are issued half-termly, after students earn a set number of positive behaviour points across their entire lifetime at Conyers. Each half term, badge holders will be entered into prize draws with the chance to win a series of amazing recognition and reward prizes. 


Preloved Uniform

Holidays are Fun Sessions



At the end of December, two groups of Sixth Form students took part in the Aviation Challenge at Hartlepool College.








More recently, a group of 100 students from across Years 9, 10 and 11 took part in the Intermediate Maths Challenge, which is run every year by UKMT. This required students to complete a selection of challenging questions that encourage students to develop mathematical reasoning, precision of thought, and fluency in using basic mathematical techniques to solve interesting problems.

The theme for Focus Day 3 was resilience and team building; one of the activities that Year 7 students were set was about Codebreaking. As well as finding out about some of the history of code breaking, they got to make and use Caesar Ciphers – this was a challenge that some students found confusing at first but, through perseverance, they got the hang of it and were soon enjoying decoding complex problems. For Year 8 there was a code-breaking trail around school, and students in Year 10 were also set some challenges; well done to Grace F and Hanna D who successfully completed the Super Challenge set by Mrs Dixon! In lessons, students continue to work hard tackling many different activities on their iPads as well as completing hands on tasks like the negative numbers card sort below:





On top of the amazing work tackled in lessons, some of our most able Year 11 students have been getting a taster of advanced maths topics such as factor theorem and matrix transformations. The group meets on a Wednesday lunch time in 320 with Mrs Beer.

Other students have been engaging in weekly parallel challenges - these are a range of activities, puzzles and problems that investigate the mystery and history of maths. A big shout out to Tyler G (Year 7) and Luca P (Year 8), who have been attempting these each week.

Youth Climate Change Event

The Student Parliament arranged for the Bright Minds Big Futures group to come in and discuss the launch of a Youth Climate Coalition across the Teesside area.

This followed on from the Question Time event on the environment at Conyers School in November.

Neil Mitchell, the Head of Environment, Leisure, and Green Infrastructure at Stockton-on-Tees Borough Council, spoke passionately about what the council and schools can do to reach the net zero target by 2032.

This may prove challenging for our region given the industries that have been established in our area. For this reason, we need to get creative and look for ways to reduce our carbon footprint. Some suggestions from students from schools that attended included:

- Walking to school as the weather is getting better.
- Parents turning off their car engines if waiting to pick up their child.
- More students bringing in their own reusable water bottles rather than buying disposable ones every day.

The event was a success and Heads of the Climate Committee of the Student Parliament Daniel Sauron and Joe Fixter are currently looking at pragmatic ways to reduce Conyers impact on the environment. These include encouraging students to bring in their own bottles as well as looking at ways to limit the use of single use plastics.

This half term has seen the training for the Duke of Edinburgh Bronze award study take a step outside for the first time with the current cohort. They have been working incredibly hard in the classroom working on their route planning, distance measuring and route card, and have finally been able to take what they have learnt in the classroom and see it come to fruition out in the open spaces of the North Yorkshire Moors. The groups planned and executed with great success a route starting and finishing at Guisborough Forest and Walkway Visitor Centre taking in Hutton village and Roseberry Topping along the way. The next walk will see the group exploring a different location but with equally spectacular views. Well done to everyone that took part and completed the training walk. Science club

This half term the science club have been taking part in a forensic science project. Science club members have been looking at fingerprint analysis to identify a murder weapon, identified the pen of a murder note using chromatography and analysed witness statements. After half term topics that will be investigated are, using microscopes to identify fibre samples found at a crime scene, using flame tests to identify a metal found on the victim's clothing and testing the pH of soil samples taken. We are always looking for enthusiastic scientists of the future and ideas of what to investigate next.




